

Due to the volatility of the power market, the City could not secure favorable bids for power supply and suspended the municipal aggregation program for up to 18 months. The City hopes to find better rates next year.

How does the municipal aggregation program not being renewed impact residents of Warrenville?

For many people, there will be no change. Residents supplied by Eligo will return to ComEd for their supply. They will receive a letter in August or September informing them of the change.

Will this impact the rate of any residents participating in the aggregation program?

No, all residents in Warrenville, without their own private supplier, will continue paying the ComEd rate. Throughout the duration of the aggregation program, there was no change in the rate for residents.

If I have a power outage, or any issues with my service, who do I contact?

Residents should contact ComEd at (800) 334-7661 if they have any issues. This has always been the case throughout the aggregation program.

Will the City renew the municipal aggregation in the future?

Currently the markets are too volatile to find anything worthwhile for residents. However, the City's aggregation consultant will continue to keep an eye on the market and notify the City when the program is viable again.

Is the City still getting 100% green energy?

No, the City is able to support the production of green energy as part of the electric aggregation program and a supply contract. While the program is suspended, the contribution to producing green energy is limited to what ComEd provides.

If the City renews an aggregation agreement in the future, will I need to opt in?

No. Eligible households that were included in the aggregation program will continue to be included unless you have contracted with an independent supplier or are otherwise ineligible.
